WELCOME VISITORS: We welcome you to worship with us today. Whether you are an Orthodox Christian or this is your first visit to the Orthodox Church, we are pleased to have you with us. Although Holy Communion is offered only to the baptized and chrismated (confirmed) Orthodox Christians, in good standing with the Church, all are invited to receive the antidoron (blessed bread) from the priest at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy. The antidoron is not sacramental but is reminiscent of the agape feast that followed worship in the ancient Christian Church. After the Divine Liturgy this morning, please join us in the church hall for fellowship, refreshments and visit with our Clergy, our Parish Council and the Stewards of our Parish.

THOUGHT: Our favorite attitude should be gratitude.

COOPERATION IS NEEDED! We remind our faithful that the Orthros Service begins at 8:00 a.m. on Sunday in the Cathedral and is followed immediately by the Divine Liturgy. **Please be prompt and on time!** Please turn off cell phones before entering church. No conversation should take place during worship. During the reading of the Gospel people in the narthex should not be purchasing or lighting candles, but stand reverently and listen to the reading. If possible avoid using the center aisle during high points of Divine Liturgy. Lipstick and lip-gloss should be removed before kissing icons, receiving Holy Communion and kissing the hand of the priest. Only Orthodox Christians in good standing with the Church may receive Holy Communion. Parents with children who cannot sit quietly during services should use the cry room. Please avoid using cell phones, I-Pads or other electronic devices to entertain or amuse children during worship. This delivers the wrong message of why we are in church and allows the child to pick up bad habits. When receiving antidoron, please, use both hands and do not allow the crumbs to fall.

STEWARDSHIP NOTE: With the end of September coming quickly upon us, we will have finished three-quarters of 2019. Yet there are still many members who have failed to make a financial pledge of commitment to our parish. There are others who have pledged, yet for some unknown reason have failed to keep their word of commitment. Thank God for those few who have made their commitment, met it, and are now surpassing it. SAINT OF THE DAY – PHOCAS THE MARTYR BISHOP OF SINOPE:

As a young man, Phocas was filled with the Holy Spirit, he cast our demons and healed the sick. He was appointed bishop of the city of Sinope. By example and instruction, he turned many away from idol worship and to the one true God. One day, a dove placed a crown of flowers on the head of Phocas and in a human voice told him that his cup has been filled and it was proper that he drink it. He understood that he had been asked to become a martyr. While still in the body, he was crowned from heaven like the Forty Holy Martyrs of Sebaste. Phocas was later delivered to Prince Africanus who attempted to get him to honor and sacrifice to the idols. Phocas said that he would not give manmade things the honor due to the Creator. They tied him to a tree and ripped his flesh with tortures. A voice from heaven helped him to endure this. They tried to fry his body in a heated pan, but the pan cooled before it could burn him. They put him in a dark prison cell, but a light from heaven illumined him. Finally, he was put into a boiling bath, and it was there that he gave up his spirit to God. His grave has been the site of many miracles.

A POWERFUL TRANSFORMER: What a wonderful picture today’s Gospel lesson paints for us. When Peter realized the wonderful miracle that had been brought before his eyes, he fell down at Jesus’ feet and prayed, **“Depart from me, O Lord, for I am a sinful man.”** Christ then told Peter: **“Do not be afraid. From henceforth you will be fisher of men.”** It was after this that Peter, along with James and John, left their work and homes and went to be the Lord’s Apostles.

The important lesson here is this: Jesus can bring out the very best in people. The Lord can make you your best self. No one else and nothing else can accomplish this. Education will not make you your best self. Wealth will not bring out the best that is in you. Power and position does not bring forth the glory in man. **ONLY JESUS CHRIST CAN!** Jesus Christ can make you the finest man or woman that is in your power to become.

Before we can shine with our best joy, our best work, our best love, we must be exposed to the strong light of Christ’s influence. **“I am the light of the world,”** Jesus said, **“he who follows Me does not walk in darkness...”**

Peter shows us the process of baring ourselves to Christ. When Peter came to the realization of Who Christ was and who he was, he fell on his knees before the Lord in worship, and at the same time groveled in the dust because of his own sinfulness. When we do that, when we become aware of Christ’s greatness and our smallness, of His holiness and our sinfulness, then we become the light of Christ.

Has Christ influenced your life? Are you all you could be? Are you living up to your potential? **LET HIS LIFE TOUCH YOURS!**

TEACHINGS OF THE FATHERS: St. Maximos says that he who receives and performs the commandments of God, contains mystically within himself the Holy Trinity. In that Jesus Christ, the Word of God the Father is mystically found in each of His own commandments. And God the Father is totally inseparable from His word. Moreover, he receives the Holy Spirit which coexists with them.
